Aileen Lambert

Art Form: Traditional song, music, visual art, video, song-writing, documentary making.

Specialisations: Traditional singing, song research, participatory arts, song-writing/composition, community arts, education.

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Projects

Aileen offers a wide range of traditional song projects and workshops tailored to all ages, interests and abilities. Her work centres on encouraging others to sing, expanding participants' repertoire and fostering confidence in a welcoming, inclusive environment. Projects may involve researching and collecting local songs, learning and interpreting traditional material, exploring songs linked to a chosen theme, or developing new work through song-writing and composition.

Workshops often incorporate performance elements, where participants record or present the songs they have learned, creating a meaningful sense of ownership and achievement. Aileen's adaptable approach ensures that even those unfamiliar with traditional singing can connect through lively action songs, humorous pieces, themed songs related to personal interests, or songs rooted in local heritage. Visual art, photography, video and audio recording may also be woven into projects, enhancing documentation, creativity and participant engagement. The overarching emphasis is on enjoyment, participation and cultivating a deeper appreciation for traditional song within communities.

About Aileen

Aileen Lambert is a traditional singer, researcher, song-writer, composer and educator whose work is deeply rooted in Ireland's song heritage. With a background in visual arts and over twenty years' experience in participatory arts practice, she brings a distinctive creative approach to traditional song projects - from collecting and interpreting songs to composing new airs.

Aileen is an experienced music educator and has delivered workshops and community projects across all age groups and abilities. For the past fifteen years she has been a specialist with the Heritage in Schools Scheme, teaching traditional song throughout the southeast. She frequently performs with her three daughters, who also feature in many of her online workshops. Her publication *The Frog and the Mouse - Traditional Irish Songs for Children* (2021) reflects her dedication to preserving and sharing song heritage with younger generations. With additional experience in performance art, video, photography and public art commissions, Aileen is strongly committed to promoting traditional song and devising meaningful, community-focused creative projects.



Al Bellamy

Art Form: Theatre & Performance Director

Areas of Specialisation: Audience & Artist Accessibility, Disability-Led, Intersectional Work

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Projects

I can provide a series of drama and performance workshops to develop new work, to build confidence and to explore new ideas, for example 3 days of devising a new script and 5 days of rehearsal.

I can also offer participant mentorship in devising and developing new work/performances, as well as directing skills, over a period of time.

I can also provide workshops on embedding accessibility in community spaces and in artistic presentations for audiences and artists alike. These workshops can look at embedding accessibility into already produced work (e.g. an exhibition, theatre production, performance art), or embedding access from the start of a new artistic project.

I am interested in exploring new, multi-disciplinary, identity-led work with LGBTQIA+ disabled individuals, and exploring Intersectionality in projects. I offer a participant focused experience, where every decision gives the community group creative autonomy over their work.

About Al

My directing credits include: 'Yellow' (Draíocht Arts Centre, Granary Theatre, Neuroconvergence, National Festival of Youth Theatres, Bounce Disability Arts Festival) from November 2022 to July 2025, and 'Close All Tabs' (Smock Alley Boys School, Scene + Heard Festival 2024).

I developed and directed a groundbreaking new piece of theatre, 'Home Sweet Home,' with Jody O'Neill and Suisha Inclusive Arts which premiered in the Granary Theatre in Cork Midsummer Festival 2024 and was funded by my Arts Council Arts Participation Project Award.

In 2022, I was funded by the Arts Council Agility Award for Mythics, creating a space for neurodivergent people to explore reworkings of Irish Folklore and Mythology. In 2023, I received the Arts Council Theatre Bursary to develop a holistic methodology for disability-inclusive practice. I have given workshops on Creatively Embedded Access in the Eduard Smilgis Theatre, Riga, for Disrupt Disability Arts Festival, Lasta Festival and Dublin Fringe Festival. I have recently been awarded the Arts Council Participatory Arts Project Award for 2026 to develop 'Stimphony' for Cork Midsummer Festival. I am happy to serve in the All In/Uile Ann Advisory Group for the Arts Council of Ireland, and the Independent Artists Working Group for Performing Arts Forum.



Amy Redmond

Artform: Writer & Director

Areas of Specialisation: Theatre, Film, Literature,

Visual Art

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Projects

Amy Redmond offers a focused programme of creative workshops to community groups drawing on her background in theatre, film, writing, drawing, collage-making and participatory arts. Future projects can focus on any of the below disciplines.

Improvisation & Ensemble Play workshops that build confidence, spontaneity, and communication through games, physical expression, and collaborative scene work.

Voice, Text & Performance sessions support groups in developing vocal ease, storytelling presence, and expressive clarity, informed by training with Patsy Rodenburg and Ann Bogart.

Devising for Theatre & Community Storytelling workshops, guiding participants to create original scenes and performances based on lived experience—an approach shaped by the development of her play *Home*.

Smartphone Filmmaking workshops, teaching practical skills in scripting, shooting, and editing accessible short documentary films, based on her Screen Ireland training and experience with *Night Terrors*.

Beginners' Creative Writing or Flash Fiction, Travel & Memoir Writing, and Poetry Workshops, drawing on her publications in RTÉ Books Ireland, and print media.

Visual-arts-based Drawing & Collage for Mindfulness & Observation sessions are available, built on her QQI training in drawing and painting.

All workshops emphasise play, psychological safety, and creative confidence—tailored to youth groups, mental health communities, arts collectives and neighbourhood organisations across Wexford.

About Amy

Amy Redmond is a multidisciplinary writer, director, and workshop facilitator whose work spans theatre, film, literature, and visual art. She is driven by the belief that storytelling can spark connection, deepen understanding, and strengthen communities. With early experience in journalism and Off-Broadway performance, she combines truth-seeking with an instinct for empathy, creating creative spaces that feel open, curious, and collaborative.

Redmond approaches each project through attentive listening, treating art-making as a dialogue with people and place. Her satirical play *Home* (2025), developed with Fatima Groups United and later selected for the International Social Housing Festival in Dublin, grew directly from community workshops exploring housing and belonging. *Women of Scorthy* (2026), funded by Creative Places Enniscorthy, invites local women to reimagine their own oral histories through sound, image, and conversation. Her broader work — including *The Midas Touch* and the short film *Night Terrors* — often explores power, gender, and identity with a blend of humour and heart. As founder of Act The Maggot, she has spent over a decade facilitating creative workshops that prioritise play, confidence, and psychological safety. In 2025 she launched Gorey's first Youth Theatre, and in May 2026 she will complete a Higher Diploma in Film & TV Production through the Irish language, and looks forward to developing projects that encourage a joyful return to learning Irish through creative play.



Anita Petry

Artform: actor, director, theatre practitioner

Areas of Specialisation: actor, director, theatre practitioner, and workshop facilitator specialising in ensemble-based story-telling, physical and devised theatre, and inclusive community-engagement practices.

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Projects

I design and deliver creative workshops that blend theatre, movement, storytelling, and playful collaboration to support groups in building confidence, communication, and a shared sense of ownership. My projects are tailored to the needs of the communities I work with—whether young people, parents, artists, or mixed-age groups—and draw on methods such as physical theatre, ensemble-building, applied theatre, and gentle somatic practices.

- Physical Theatre & Ensemble – dynamic sessions using movement, image-making, and group composition to spark creativity.
- Story & Myth-Making – collaborative creation of narratives, characters, and short performances.
- Creative Wellbeing – theatre-based exercises that support connection, emotional regulation, and confidence.
- Interdisciplinary Art Projects – integrating film, voice, and movement for community storytelling.
- Play & Creativity Exploration – sessions examining the role of play and its benefits across different settings.
- Youth-Led Creation Labs – co-designed workshops giving young people real agency in shaping artistic outcomes.
- Anything Shakespeare-related!

Across all formats, my workshops emphasise accessibility, curiosity, and a sense of play. I create environments where participants feel safe to take creative risks, explore their own ideas, and discover the joy of making something together.

About Anita

Originally from Brazil, I am an actor, director, theatre artist, workshop facilitator, and doula based in Enniscorthy, where my work focuses on creativity, community, and embodied practice. With a Master's Degree from Columbia University, I bring a deep foundation in physical theatre, expressive movement, and ensemble creation, informed by methodologies such as Linklater Voice, the Viewpoints, and a range of acting techniques.

My recent work includes facilitating To The Power of Three, a Shared Island youth arts project connecting teens across Tallaght, Derry, and Enniscorthy; directing the large-scale outdoor processional performance The Night Belongs to Youth; and producing Connection gatherings for professional artists to meet, exchange ideas, and access high-quality CPD opportunities through my work with the Creative Places Enniscorthy Ground Group.

Alongside my arts practice, I bring skills from my doula work—active listening, trauma-informed facilitation, and an understanding of group dynamics—which deeply shape my ability to hold space for diverse participants. My aim is always to empower communities to tell their own stories, build connection, and experience the transformative possibilities of art-making together.

About Amy

As a professional artist for over ten years I have facilitated art workshops in Primary and Secondary schools, Youth Reach, various community groups from Mens Sheds to Active Retired, Day Care Centres and Youth Groups.

Artist Statement: I am a practising, professional visual artist working in sculptural site-specific installation with a background in photography. I often create large-scale installations using repurposed, recycled and reappropriated materials placed outdoors. I am interested in highlighting the aesthetics of space/place by juxtaposing the man-made in the natural environment. I am interested in the shape, form and materiality of different objects, especially how they interact with light. How light can animate, reflect and react to light, both natural and artificial, is a common theme within my work and I often suspend my work thereby occupying the aerial space and encouraging viewers to look up.



Becci Whelan

Areas of Specialisation: Community & Inclusive Dance, Contemporary & Technical Dance Training, Creative Choreography, Participatory Arts Practice, Movement & Mindfulness, Dance for Wellbeing, Youth & Adult Education, Performance Facilitation

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Projects

I deliver inclusive dance projects and workshops that combine technical dance training, choreography, creative exploration, and mindfulness. My sessions are structured yet adaptable, supporting participants to build physical skills, confidence, and expressive freedom within a positive and enjoyable learning environment.

Each project is shaped around the needs of the group and may include technical warm-ups, coordination and strength work, creative movement tasks, choreographic development, and guided relaxation or meditation. Projects can range from one-off workshops to multi-week programmes or residencies and are suitable for schools, youth groups, adults, and mixed-ability community settings.

I value both process and outcome. While enjoyment, connection, and wellbeing are central, participants are also supported to develop their artistic skills and, where appropriate, share their work through informal showings or public performance. My approach ensures that dance is experienced both as a rigorous artform and as a supportive space for personal growth and expression.

About Becci

I am a professional dance artist based in New Ross County Wexford, working in community and participatory dance since 2008. I hold a Postgraduate Diploma in Dance Studies from the Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance, and my practice is grounded in strong technical training alongside inclusive and creative methodologies.

I work as a tutor and facilitator across a wide range of programmes and partnerships, including WWETB, Creative Ireland, the Department of Education, Wexford County Council Arts Department, Sports Active Wexford, Dance Ireland, and ISACS. My work spans schools, youth settings, adult education, and community contexts.

My practice is fully inclusive and rooted in the belief that dance is for everyone. I use play, structure, and creativity to meet people where they are, creating supportive environments where participants can engage with movement in ways that feel meaningful, empowering, and enjoyable.

Brendan Fahy

Artform: Juggling and Circus Arts

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Projects

I am a teacher and performer of juggling and circus skills for adults and children. My workshops focus on fun, achievable tricks with a variety of different props, to make sure that every student leaves with a feeling of accomplishment and pride. Each class uses multiple different props to develop skills of balance, throwing/catching, and object manipulation. Longer sessions, or multiple sessions, allow for progressing beyond the introductory tricks, to highly visual multi-person passing patterns and even the creation of short performance routines.

Juggling is non-competitive, social, and has an enormous range of proven benefits, both physical and mental, to people of all ages. Circus skills are for everyone – no previous hand-eye coordination needed!

About Brendan

I've performed and taught all over Ireland, for ages 6-60+, in a variety of contexts such as schools, youth groups, festivals, sports clubs, team-building exercises, and social programmes. This work ranges from introductory classes covering a range of circus props, to adult-and-child workshops focusing on partner tricks, to juggling intensives for sports clubs looking to develop hand-eye coordination.

I'm registered with the Teacher Artist Partnership (TAP+) programme and 'BLAST: Arts in Education' through Wexford Education Support Centre, and I'm a professional member of the Irish Street Arts, Circus & Spectacle Network (ISACS).



Caoimhe Dunn

Artform: Street Performance & Spectacle, Visual Arts, Theatre Maker

Areas of Specialisation: large scale props, giant puppetry, willow lantern making, carnival arts, mask-making and performance.

Projects

Caoimhe can deliver workshops in a range of skills from large scale work like willow lantern processions and carnival arts parades, to more intimate indoor work creating shadow puppets, exploring light and dark. All workshops are individually tailored for the group participating and can include a mix of workshops building up to an indoor or outdoor performance, showcase or installation. Workshops can include the following: Carnival Arts Workshops Participants gain skills in large-scale prop and costume construction, and even giant puppet making, for outdoor performance, as well as the practicalities of working together in groups and performing as a team. Willow Lantern making Workshop

Participants can create a simple lantern introducing the skills involved before creating larger lanterns for processions or installations- with Shapes of all types achievable to create a fantastic display of light. Shadow Play or Puppetry Workshops Starting with found objects, creating images and characterisation, the workshop can develop into the creation of simple puppets to create more complex stories. Participants can also explore some different types of Puppetry - exploring movement/balance and weight, participants learn about the complexity of string puppets and how simple movements can be used to great effect

About Caoimhe

Caoimhe is a Wexford based artist and has been involved for many years in Street Performance & Spectacle, Community & Youth Arts. During 2025 she created work with community groups for festivals, including Biddy's Day Festival - Kerry, Longford Lights - Longford and Tower & Tales Festival - Waterford, and has performed at the St Patrick's Day Festival in Limerick & Dublin. Recent work includes 'Puffins on Parade' created with Mercy Mounthawk School for the National Circus Festival of Ireland in Tralee 2024. Over Summer 2024, with Birr Vintage Week, she trained local volunteers, creating costumes and props for their parade inspired by the wildlife of the local river. She has taken part in Artist in the community projects since 2017 - including projects with the Wexford Arts Centre - 2023 and the Festival of Ferns - 2024. As part of her practice Caoimhe enjoys exploring folk traditions in Ireland. Her work relies on the participation of communities to bring ideas to life. Passing on skills to others always plays a large part in her work. She is a member of the Irish Street Art, Circus and Spectacle Network and keen to promote interest and engagement in Street Arts & Spectacle.



Cat Hogan

Artform: Literature

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Projects

The workshops will focus on storytelling, writing, imagination and identity. Workshops and courses can be organised according to the needs of each individual group, being mindful of literacy levels, distinctive socio-economic, ethnic, cultural and historical backgrounds.

About Cat

I am a Wexford Novelist and screen writer, passionate about literature, development of the arts, social inclusion, and literacy development within communities. I've published two fiction novels, *They All Fall Down*, and the *Bord Gais Energy* nominated Crime Fiction of the Year Novel, *There Was A Crooked Man*. My third novel is on submission, and I am working on the latest book and screenplay. Through the Creative Communities Artist's panel and my own projects for the last number of years, I've worked with multiple communities and groups, including Wexford Library Service, Write By the Sea, University of Limerick, Cashew Project, Write Pace, Youth Train, Acquired Brain Injury Ireland, Rehab Care, Tomhaggard Women's Shed, Taghmon Community Group, HSE, WWETB, and The National Learning Network, using creative writing as a form of self-expression, enhancing creativity and recording stories through fiction and memoir, capturing stories from the community. I use creative writing as a tool to promote mental health and wellness.

I have successfully delivered my programmes in many schools in the County of Wexford including Selskar College, Enniscorthy Vocational College and Bunclody Vocational College. I also work in adult education in a training centre for adults with additional needs. I have a degree in Law and a master's degree in criminology, specialising in global migration studies, far right extremism, populist politics, media and language.

I was the recipient of The John Hewitt Society Bursary Award and the University of Limerick Winter Writing School residency in 2018—returning to UL in 2019 as a mentor. I received the 2019 Bursary for Tyrone Guthrie. I was a Writer in (their) Residence for the Irish Writers Centre 2020. I was appointed Culture Ambassador for Wexford 2020. I was the recipient of The Literature Bursary Award with The Arts Council, and the Agility award. I am also a literary curator and regular panellist at literary festivals and events, and a panellist on Southeast Radio. As an avid promotor of culture and the Arts, I'm committed to equal access, inclusion and equality across all platforms.

Areas of Specialisation: Visual Art and Print

Projects

· My main workshop media is print / mark making with inks and other mixed media, in a creative, fun, mindful manner: all levels welcome - no prior printmaking experience required

Working with inks and everyday objects, to narrate stories

Creating individual pieces, using a selection of methods and a range of print surfaces, including 3D e.g. air drying clay

Print / Mark making collaborative pieces

· I encourage workshop participants to gather found, gifted, source materials, take photographs, drawings, rubbings, and collect anecdotes and texts. I provide a mixture of non-standard surfaces to draw, print on / 'stitch into' and collage, e.g. linen effect paper, and fine art surfaces, e.g. Fabriano / Canson paper, for intricate fine ink drawings.

· My practice focuses on "collaborative story telling " using everyday objects, the more personal the better, giving people (including myself) a voice and the right to have our stories told, listened to, and understood.

About Deirdre

My art practice, which is experimental in nature and driven by a positive, intuitive, and curious approach, comprises:

- studio based work
- collaborative / community residencies, projects and workshop facilitation.

I bring an energised, positive, inquisitive, hard-working approach, coupled with broad experience in a range of artistic processes, procedures and art practice learning. My work is often created through subconscious mark making on Indian/watercolour ink dyed linen effect paper. It is informed by research projects e.g. on the Boyne Valley (Newgrange, Dowth and Knowth) and the kerbstone/chamber/tunnel/'tomb & womb' narrative of this hidden world.

My interpersonal skills have been crucial in achieving successful collaborations with community groups. I have had particular success in the following Creative Communities Projects:

2019: 'Coercive Control' Project, with Wexford Women's Refuge, which we expanded into an exhibition in Creative Hub "THIS IS WHAT IT IS"

2022: Windmill Therapeutic project, looking at what it is like to be an adult with intellectual disabilities, which we expanded to an exhibition "HOME GATHERING OF FRIENDS"

2023: SI Wexford (Soroptimists) project, looking at 'Orange the World' and "16 Days of Activism Against Gender Based Violence", which we expanded to an exhibition "HEED" in Wexford County Hall, Carriglawn. I have also facilitated numerous community based visual arts projects e.g. with Forde Counselling, Acquired Brain Injury Ireland and Access 2000/Women's Collective Wexford.



Elke Williams

Artform: Visual Art

Areas of Specialisation: Ceramics

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Socials: printmakershub.ie



Projects

I am experienced in most ceramic techniques including indoor and outdoor mosaic work and can offer introductory courses for groups of all ages.

Courses can be held on one day, over a weekend or as regular evening classes. Times can be adapted to suit the participants.

A planning conversation will be held to develop a course together with the participants and cater to their needs.

Possible sample course types:

Play with clay: 4 hours including break.

Introduction to ceramic techniques course will encompass hand building techniques such as pinch pot forming, coil building and slab forming.

Participants will experience all techniques and can then choose to focus on one style to create a piece of work.

Wild Clay weekend: Connect with your local Wexford history!

Outdoor workshop with Wild clay that is collected at the beach or dug from the ground and then cleaned and finally used to create small vessels or sculptural work.

Tell a story with clay: 2 hours+.

Build small scale sculptures either based on a story or develop a story to link them together.

About Elke

My approach to working with communities is rooted in inclusivity, trying to create spaces that welcome people from all walks of life, embracing their unique perspectives and cultural backgrounds.

By attempting to actively involve everyone in decision-making and idea generation, individuals are empowered and may feel a sense of ownership over the artistic journey and their product.

I am a firm believer that having fun whilst creating with our hands opens us up to sharing what is essential to us.

Trained as a primary and secondary teacher I hold a BA International in Fine Art Glass and Ceramics from NCAD.

This is backed up by over 25 years of experience in living and working with children and adults from all over the world in inclusive communities.

I am regularly teaching Adult classes in Gorey and am part of the Teacher Artist Partnership teaching in schools.

Apart from that I have successfully collaborated with diverse groups, ranging from the inclusive adult communities of Camphill Communities of Ireland to cultural organizations, such as the Wexford Women's Collective and the Rural Connections Programme to more focused local community art projects such as 'Invitation to a conversation' by the SOWN initiative in Ballyfad.

I am a founding member of Gorey Art Collective, where I have run summer workshop programmes for adults and children and joined in hosting their annual culture night event.



Fadi Zmorrod

Artform: Circus

Areas of Specialisation: Circus Artist

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Projects

In community settings, Fadi uses social circus as a tool for development of a multitude of skills; trust, cooperation, concentration, creative expression and much more. He prefers to work with groups over longer term periods, as he has seen countless times the transformative power that circus has in many, including severely at-risk communities.

About Fadi

Fadi Zmorrod is an award winning contemporary circus artist and director from Jerusalem, Palestine. He is currently Artistic Director of Doulab for Circus and Dance and of Rí Rá Festival of Children's Arts.

He has been working in his field for almost 20 years, and is specialised as an artist in the Chinese pole, acrobatics, and Cyr wheel. He graduated from Cirko Vertigo in Italy, and spent the following years touring worldwide with international contemporary circus, dance and theatre companies, as well as with his own award winning work.

He also co-founded the Palestinian Circus School back in 2006, and has taught, mentored and trained professional artists and people of all backgrounds throughout Palestine, Europe and globally.

He is currently a recipient of the 2025 Arts & Inclusion Bursary from DLR County Council, and was the 2023/24 SEVN Bursary Awardee, and a recipient of the Arts Council of Ireland's Agility Award in 2022, and Bursary Award in 2025.



Garret Keogh

Artform: actor/writer/theatre maker/festival director

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Projects

As well as an extensive career as an actor, I have always embraced community and participative arts practices in my work. I co-founded and have directed the Gap Arts Festival since 2011. And I have facilitated workshops with the Young Abbey, the Children's T Company, the VEC, and here in north Wexford and online.

From theatre-making, to script writing, from acting, producing, event and community festival organising, I consult with individuals, groups and communities of place and interest, exploring your local interests, and devising with you participative workshop programmes.

I've been building pizza or clay ovens since 2012, most recently with a local womens shed where we built our oven, made air-dried clay bricks for use in their home-made barbecue, using clay subsoil sourced onsite. We fired up our oven and demonstrated how to make fresh yeast pizza dough which was then cooked in our oven, all over a 32 hour session. In 2021 I delivered a cob roundhouse build workshop over the summer in The Irish National Heritage Park open to the public as a demonstration of traditional building techniques. I've also delivered my own printmaking and other natural building workshops with The Heritage Park as one of their craft tutors. I've been delivering my own natural build workshops and demonstrating at craft fairs and festivals nationally for 12 years.

In 2021 while working in a prominent community garden in Ballymun I led workshops with local primary schools building small scale vernacular mud wall models typical of our traditional housing . I delivered this workshop with Selsker College in Wexford and the Heritage Park in the same year with a local secondary school. Learners made use of natural materials they found onsite and clay to create their own small scale shelters.

As a registered teacher I've worked with varying ages and communities; primary, secondary and further education. I've worked with Youthreach in inner city Cork for four years and with Syrian refugees in Kilkenny and other nationalities learning English as a foreign language.


Working in Community groups is reflexive. 



1) Community-building workshops for groups wishing to undertake either a sound/music-oriented project, or an ecologically-oriented project:

I enjoy getting group-participants to identify why they are involved, what they hope to gain from their involvement, how they see themselves individually and as a group member, and how they can work together to develop and realise a collective vision, and develop autonomy and agency amongst themselves. This work is suitable for longer-term projects (6 workshops or more), and is primarily based on group discussion and reflection.

2) Vocal or sound improvisation workshops:

I believe musicality is innate, and that everyone can make music given the necessary time, space and support. Music-making can serve as both a meditative practice and an artistic practice. 

Participants come to appreciate the value of all that they recall, and learn the joy of expressing that in the most effective and pleasing way.

Writing provides an opportunity to taste life anew, to make sense of experiences good and adverse, to tell the stories that need to be told, however 'insignificant' they might seem, and to enable the teller to grow in personal confidence and agency as they discover the unique depth of their work.



About Margaret

Projects

Projects offered have at their centre the principle of using visual media to explore/express current and relevant social issues experienced by young people, older people, disability groups and community organisations in contemporary society.

Programmes have at their core a desire to facilitate and encourage healthy emotional expression in an experiential and practical creative environment. This is of particular importance in the lived experience of individuals/groups where other opportunities/outlets for safe emotional expression are either limited or non-existent. Filmmaking has the added advantage of realising a physical end product in the shape of a completed piece of visual work that can be shared with the wider community/society (at a possible Red Carpet Premier Event) creating a sense of completion and success for all participants involved.

"Participants who have a history of in-depth arts involvement show better academic outcomes than those with less arts involvement. They earn better grades and have higher rates of third level enrolment and attainment." US National Endowment for the Arts, 2012.

Programme design is very much consultative in nature and participant led and can be used by participating groups to promote awareness of their service, highlight a social issue impacting the particular group or indeed simply be a fun dive into the process of making a film.

Programmes can include (but are not limited to) film and pre-production, scripting and casting, using a camera, acting for camera, editing and post production and of course the option for having a formal screening of the finished work to share with friends, family and the wider viewing public.

Michael is multi award winning and hard-working film creative with over fifteen years' experience across a broad range of creative programme types. He has completed work for, and delivered material to Bord Bia, Bank of Ireland, Coite, Wexford County Council, Wicklow County Council as well as multiple local and national businesses.

Projects

I create a wide range of thematic, community-rooted projects. Depending on group I may involve folklore collection, filmmaking, or the revival of local customs. I might create a documentary based on a local story or develop a new body of songs inspired by place. I regularly bring groups walking through fields and laneways to observe what surrounds them, or produce publications on vernacular furniture, domestic traditions and material culture. My projects can take the form of exhibitions of historic or folkloric sites, digital maps of local areas, or explorations of objects and treasures found in people's homes, sheds and yards. A recent example is a community museum project developed with Kilanerin Tidy Towns, which uncovered and celebrated personal items of cultural and emotional significance. What underpins all these projects is genuine collaboration and more than two decades of experience working with communities.

I have worked in this field for almost twenty-five years, and throughout that time I have helped broaden conversations about the meeting point of traditional and contemporary cultures in Ireland. My work contributes to a deeper appreciation of culture in all its manifestations—especially folklore, the ordinary, and the everyday.

I'm available to give workshops in writing, this includes writing in many forms - especially poetry and creative nonfiction. I'm also interested in expanding on what it is to write beyond the page. I can advise on anything from practical strategies to becoming a writer to exploring writing as a medium in itself, in a more playful way. 

- The Creative Ireland Rural Connections Project in Castlebridge, A new project could continue the mission of bringing people together through the arts to explore creativity, identity, and local culture.

- Develop creativity, self-confidence, and self-expression,
- Learn skills in acting, writing, directing, and technical production, and
- Experience the camaraderie and achievement of creating something entirely

new together. Above all, the project would celebrate community spirit, imagination, and the joy of collaborative creation.

I am a dancer and choreographer and often work with video, photography, writing, sound, music and voice as part of my process. Collaboration sits at the heart of my practice, with a strong focus on working with communities to explore shared place, history, the natural world and lived experience.

I value individual experience while building something collective and meaningful. Each project is shaped to suit the needs, interests and comfort levels of the group, and the form adapts accordingly. In recent years, my Artist in the Community work has focused on participation and on finding sensitive ways to capture the work, including film, audio, gatherings and non- or gently performative formats developed through ongoing dialogue with participants. Projects may result in a performance, film, sharing, gathering, printed or audio work, or may focus entirely on process and experience. Outcomes are always agreed collaboratively with the group.

I work with people of all ages, from young people to older adults, and with groups ranging from complete beginners to experienced artists.
