Economic Development & Planning:

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Town and Village Streetscape Enhancement Measures 2021

The Department of Rural and Community Development has announced funding of €260,000 for Streetscape Enhancements for County Wexford in a maximum of five towns/villages. The scheme is designed to support the upgrade and enhancement of shopfronts and street facades of defined areas within selected rural town/village centres under of the Government's 5-year strategy "Our Rural Future".

The five towns/villages nominated by Wexford County Council for funding under the scheme are

- Gorey Town
- Enniscorthy Town
- New Ross Town
- Kilmore Quay
- Wexford Town

The scheme is open to applications from owners of commercial, residential or unoccupied buildings in the nominated towns who may have suitable premises for consideration under the Scheme. The maximum grant per building is €8,000.

Grant funding will be provided at the following rates:

- 70% for Individual premises 30% matched funding to be provided by building owner
- 80% for Joint applications (groups of 3 or more adjacent premises) matched funding 20%
- 100% Where painting is undertaken by direct labour by applicant.

Applications forms are available to download from www.wexfordcoco.ie or from the Economic Development Department. Applications must be accompanied by a current photograph of the building and a letter of consent from the building owner if the owner is not the applicant.

The closing date for receipt of application forms in the Economic Department is 7th September 2021, with works to be completed and all funding requests submitted to DRCD by mid-November 2021.

This funding cannot be used to replace existing schemes or existing financial commitments already approved by the Local Authority.

Town & Village Renewal Scheme 2021

Eight applications were submitted to the Department of Rural and Community Development in advance of the scheme deadline of 16th July 2021 for the Town and Village Renewal Scheme in accordance with the scheme criteria. An announcement regarding successful applications is expected in the coming months.

Vinegar Hill "The Last Stand of the Wexford Rebels of 1798" edited by Ronan O'Flaherty & Jacqui Hynes was launched at Vinegar Hill on Thursday 19th August by An Cathaoirleach, Barbara-Anne Murphy. 

Outdoor Public Space Scheme



Wexford County has been successful in an application to the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media for funding under the Outdoor Public Space Scheme 2021.

The new Outdoor Pavilion has been approved for a grant of up to €250,000.

The funding received under the Outdoor Public Space Scheme 2021 will be utilised to install a stunning new outdoor performance pavilion on the Wexford Quays. It will have some fixed seating and can accommodate approximately 500 people (seating and standing).

This high quality and multi-purpose performance venue will be freely available to artists to create enjoyable events and performances for the public all year round.

The artistic lighting will ensure that this new venue will be prominently lit up on the Quays at night-time and it will be a stunning and eye-catching new piece of architecture on the Wexford Quays. It will creatively utilise an existing expansive public realm space on the Wexford Quays which offer stunning views over the harbour and across to the iconic Raven Nature Reserve / Curracloe Beach.

Forward Planning

Draft Wexford County Development Plan 2021-2027

The Chief Executive's Report on the submissions and observations received on the Draft Plan was submitted to the Members on the 21st April 2021. The Members met to consider the Chief Executive's Report on the 26th April 2021, with further meetings taking place during the month of May and on the 14thof June at which the Members decided to defer consideration on the Chief Executive's Report and Draft Plan until a meeting on 6th September.

Heritage

Heritage Week took place from the 14th to 22nd of August. A launch was held on Slaney Street, Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford and attended by Cathaoirleach of Enniscorthy Municipal District Cllr Cathal Byrne.

Bio-diversity/Heritage

Wex Bee aware has secured funding from the Department of Department of Culture, Heritage & the Gaeltacht's National Biodiversity Action Plan. €15,300 has been granted for a new project in partnership with the Housing Department.

Working with resident groups of Local Authority owned housing estates it is planned to run All-Ireland Pollinator focused information evenings to promote changes in the management of the open space and green areas through awareness education. One meeting will take place in each of the five districts (Covid restrictions allowing).

One housing estate in each of the five districts will be selected to participate in a pilot scheme to remove areas of cut lawn and replace with suitable pollinator planting.

The project will also see the continued roll out of Wex Bee Aware, Community Apple Orchards, again on Council owned lands.

The Heritage Officer has secured €16,000 funding from Department of Department of Culture, Heritage & the Gaeltacht's National Biodiversity Action Plan to appoint a suitably qualified professional to map invasive species in a selection of historic graveyards sites that are under the care of Wexford County Council.

The project, in partnership with Community Section will see the creation of an invasive species action plan and a general maintenance plan giving a clear guide for the maintenance of the sites going forward will be a basis of in-person training, help in the production of future information publications and guidance, and for use in Wexford County Councils mapping systems.

Access Related Items

The Remote Irish Sign Language Service (supporting the Irish Sign language Act 2017)

The availability of this service has been informed to all Section Heads to inform their respective staff, the availability of the service was publicised to the public through WCC social media network and on our website earlier in the month. This Service currently available at Carricklawn head office only, however the roll out via the Library Service in each District is imminent.

Report for The Department of Transport (informing National Strategy and interagency collaboration for service provision)

Progress report for Dept. of Transports, Accessibility Consultative Committee meeting was submitted last week via the CCMA representative. This report informed on WCC progress on Actions 100- 109 and 107- 108 which also incorporated details of access works in progress and planned as part of Active Travel Measures, the Bus Shelter and the Accessible Bus Stop Programme. This information will also inform WCC update and review of our Disability and Inclusion Strategy 2019-2022 for end of year.

Access Trails and Destination Parks

Work is continuing this project with expected finish date, first week in September. Eleven areas have been identified as accessible and multiuser trails/parks with a trail and an accessible park identified for each of the Districts.

Special Projects:

1.1 Min Ryan Park

Works on the park are substantially completed and the Park was opened to the public on 15/06/2020. Public lighting is now operational.

Sole Sports and Leisure have been appointed to construct the skate park and MUGA on a design and build basis. Works are under way and are expected to be complete by early October 2021.

It is proposed to expand the existing Wexford Town Community CCTV scheme to provide a number of cameras in Min Ryan Park as a deterrent to anti-social behaviour which is unfortunately occurring occasionally in the Park. The necessary application will go before the Wexford County Council JPC meeting of 13 September, 2021.

1.2 Carrigfoyle Activity Park – Phase 1 – Trails and Carpark

This project is practically complete. Final snag works are ongoing including the sewer connection which is due to be completed end of September.

Carrigfoyle Activity Park – Phase 2 - Activity Centre Building:

The pre-planning design drawings for the development of an Activity Centre building on the site (Phase 2) were prepared by the WCC's Architect Department and a pre-planning application has been completed.

A detailed value engineering exercise is currently being undertaken on the proposed building design. This will inform the planning consent application that will be submitted in due course.

A pre-qualification suitability assessment for the design team services is currently being assessed. Consulting Engineers have been appointed to design and prepare tender documents for the boat house and associated access road and wastewater pumping station.

1.3 Enniscorthy Technology Park Phase 1:

Phase 1 – the development of three serviced sites – is substantially complete and the construction of the first building is well under way

1.4 Gorey Town Park

The external area of the park opened to the public on 12th August 2021. Completion of the building works is expected in September 2021.

Kompan Ltd. will commence playground and adult gym equipment installation in mid-September and this will take approximately one month to complete

1.5 South East Greenway:

The rail lifting and site clearance contract has been completed and initial contracts have been awarded for the construction of the greenway from Raheen to the Red Bridge and for the New Ross and Ferrybank urban sections with works are advancing well. The works on the entire Greenway are due to be completed by Spring 2023.

1.6 Trinity Wharf:

Tenders for a works contract for the new access road to serve the development are currently being assessed. WCC is advancing the works licence agreements required from CIE for the construction of the access road and the new level crossing with a view to commencing works in Q4 2021.

Procurement of consultants for the main public infrastructure development works is underway. A tender notice regarding pre-qualification will re-issue before end of August.

1.7 New Ross Fire Station:

The contract to construct the New Ross Fire Station has been awarded to Kevin Thorpe Ltd. Works commenced on site 28/05/2021 and will take 9 months to complete.

1.8 Wexford Arts Centre Extension

The main works contract has been awarded to McKelan Construction Ltd and works commenced on site on May 6th following lifting of Level 5 restrictions. Completion is expected in June 2022.

1.9 High Hill, New Ross:

The High Hill site is a strategic urban site, currently derelict, which connects John Street and the town centre with the 12th century St Mary's Church and Cemetery.

The proposed works consist of a Norman themed garden with an arrival plaza at the top of Bridge Street with steps up to St Mary's and a network of small pockets of gardens. Within the garden there will be a number of levels of platforms for resting places and areas where people can meet and chat and there will also be performance areas.

The works contract for High Hill was awarded to MJS Civil Engineering July and works have commenced on site.

The contract is expected to be substantially completed by Q2 2022.

1.10 Kilmore Quay Link Road:

Works are expected to be completed in September 2021.

1.11 Monck Street Enhancement Scheme:

The detailed design is progressing and it is expected to commence works before the end of the year.

1.12 New Ross Public Realm - Phase 1: Removal of Bulk Fuel Storage Tanks:

This project consists of removal of the oil tank structures on the Quay and the development of public realm works on the site.

The Advance Works Contract (Removal of Tanks) was completed in July 2021.

A Part VIII planning consent application for the development of the public realm space on the site is being prepared and is expected to be lodged in Q4 2021.

1.13 Templeshannon Regeneration, Enniscorthy:

The Templeshannon Regeneration Strategy identifies a number of enabling projects required to achieve regeneration, including:

- Improving the public realm and streetscape in Templeshannon area;
- Establishing a new link to the town centre by construction of a new pedestrian bridge;
- The management and progressive transformation of the Leisure Centre Car Park;
- The creation of new urban blocks for infill development.

WCC is engaged in a negotiated procedure process for design services for the development of the masterplan, preliminary design and preparation of applications for planning and statutory consents.

The site investigation (SI) work for the pedestrian bridge has been completed. The preliminary design and bridge options report has been completed taking account of the results of the SI works and is currently under review.

WCC is engaged with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage in regard to a further funding application to support regeneration in Enniscorthy.

1.14 John Street Building Regeneration Project:

WCC was successful in securing RRDF funding to design a redevelopment of the old grain stores at John Street, New Ross which will see these buildings converted into a high-quality enterprise hub.

The CPO process to acquire outstanding property in relation to this project has been commenced and is before An Bord Pleanala for consideration / approval.

1.15 Esmonde Street:

Our consultants RPS are progressing with the detailed design work and site investigation works are planned to commence in September 2021. Works, estimated at €1.5m are funding dependent, with a recent RRDF funding application not successful.

1.16 Gorey Market House:

A Part VIII planning application for re-development of the Market House into a multi-purpose performance / exhibition / retail space was approved in May 2018.

A call for Expressions of Interest / Tender Proposals from private sector investors was advertised in January 2020 and 2 submissions were received by the closing date of 13/02/2020. This tender process was concluded in May 2021 without the award of a contract.

1.17 Mechanics Institute:

John Creed & Associates were appointed in March 2020 to undertake design, tendering and construction management services for essential maintenance works at the Mechanic's Institute. Tenders were advertised in November 2020. A works contractor will be appointed in Q3 2021. There is a timeframe of 6 months for completion of construction works.

1.18 WEXFORDIA – Irish National Heritage Park (INHP), Hook Lighthouse and New Ross Tourism Projects

WCC secured RRDF category 2 funding for the development of a cluster of tourism projects within the county.

Design services are currently being procured to develop new visitor experiences at the INHP and the Hook Lighthouse and to bring the projects to 'shovel ready' status. This will include preliminary design, environmental assessment, preparing applications for planning and related development consents, detailed design and tendering for works contracts. The appointment of consultancy services teams for the INHP has been impacted by the CoVid 19 restrictions. An award of contract for the Architect-led design team has not been possible to date (as they are UK based). Some ecological surveys were carried out over Winter 2020/21 and we are in discussions with our environmental and infrastructural consultant to seek to advance their service scope as much as possible in the current circumstances.

Tenders for environmental services required to support the Hook tourism project have been assessed and an award of contract is planned for September 2021. Likewise, the appointment of design team for the tourism services will be completed in September 2021.

A preliminary interpretative design report for the Norman Centre in New Ross has been completed and was presented to the Members of the New Ross Municipal District in June 2021. The tenders for tourism co-ordination and management services for the project have been assessed and an offer to the successful tenderer is expected to issue later this month.

1.19 Enniscorthy Tourism Project:

This project provides for the phased development of a new tourism project of scale centred on Enniscorthy Castle that will have the capacity to significantly increase tourism visitor numbers to the town. The proposed project will link with associated tourism projects to be developed at the Irish National Heritage Park, Hook Lighthouse and the JFK / Dunbrody in New Ross.

The Enniscorthy Tourism Plan report was presented to the Enniscorthy MDC in July 2021. A tender brief for design services for preliminary design and planning consent applications required for Phase 1 of the project is currently being prepared and will be advertised in September 2021.

1.20 Courtown Coastal Protection & Beach Nourishment Scheme:

Following a competitive tender process, RPS Ltd has been appointed to undertake the Preliminary Design and Statutory Consents phase of the Courtown coastal protection and beach nourishment scheme.

RPS is currently reviewing existing data and preparing specifications for the surveys and investigative works required to develop the preliminary design for the project.

1.21 Rosslare Europort to Waterford City Greenway:

The Economic SPC of Wexford County Council and the Transportation SPC of Waterford City & County Council have written to the Minister for Transport seeking inclusion of the out-of-service Rosslare to Waterford railway line in the up-coming national rail review. The application for planning consent for the Rosslare to Waterford greenway project has been paused, pending a decision from the DOT on the future of the rail corridor.

WCC will review advancing the Rosslare Harbour to Rosslare Strand section as a standalone project that could link to the EuroVelo and the Wexford to Rosslare greenway project currently at feasibility stage.

1.22 Wexford to Rosslare Greenway:

Fehily Timoney and Company has been appointed to provide consultancy services for a feasibility study, route selection, preliminary design and environmental assessments for the development of this project. Constraints have been identified and ecological surveys are ongoing.

It is planned to commence a route selection public consultation in Q4 2021.

1.23 Oyster Lane Car Park, Wexford

A Part 8 submission is in preparation for the demolition of existing unoccupied buildings on the old Tesco site and for construction of a temporary surface level car park. The Part 8 process will commence in September 2021.

1.24 Crescent Quay - Dredging:

An award of contract was made to RPS Consulting Engineers in June 2021 for design services for engineering assessment, environmental and foreshore consent applications in respect of this project

1.25 Old Dublin Road Business Park, Enniscorthy:

In May 2021, a draft masterplan of this project was presented to the Members of Enniscorthy Municipal District. This was followed by a public consultation process in late June on the draft plan and comments submitted have now been reviewed.

The final masterplan is to be completed in September. A contract for the initial phase 1 works is expected to be awarded by October 2021.

An initial submission for funding was made to the NTA's active travel programme for aspects of the scheme and a further application will be made on completion of the masterplan later this year.

1.26 Enniscorthy Sports Hub:

O'Leary Sludds Architects were appointed in Feb 2021 for the detailed design, procurement of works contractor and construction management of the Sport Hub building. Modia Consulting were appointed in March to provide quantity surveying services.

Works contracts are expected to be advertised in September and it is expected that works will commence in January 2022.

1.27 Curracloe Water Sports Activity Facility:

WCC has received Stage 1 approval in principle for the development of facilities to support water sports activists at Whitegap in Curracloe, to include showers, toilets, changing facilities and lockers. WCC is currently working with Fáilte Ireland towards obtaining Stage 2 approval.

Given the early stage of the project, the timeline for delivery is as yet uncertain.

1.28 Fáilte Ireland Destination Towns Project:

Following an application to Fáilte Ireland for the Destination Towns Scheme in late 2019, the maximum grant of €500,000 was awarded for the New Ross Destination Towns Project in early 2020.

The aim of the Project is to develop New Ross as a destination by improving wayfinding, promoting and connecting local amenities, developing a night-time economy and increasing dwell time in the area.

This complements the planned delivery of the South East Greenway and the recently completed ew Ross Bypass to promote New Ross as a Norman Heritage Town. This is being done by means of way finding signs, street name plates, promotion and awareness of walking trails and the provision of a visitor information kiosk on the Quay.

2. Flood Defence Schemes

2.1 Enniscorthy Flood Defence Scheme:

The Enniscorthy Flood Defence scheme awaits statutory confirmation from the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform (DPER) in order to proceed. The confirmation process involves a formal review of the Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR) and Natura Impact Statement (NIS) by DPER and a public consultation process.

WCC issued supplementary environmental information to the OPW on the 27th April 2021, which was submitted to DPER on the 30th April 2021. A decision is expected in September 2021.

Pending the above confirmation, we will continue to progress the detailed design, shortlisting of contractors for the main construction works, and the attainment of all necessary licences and legal agreements required for the construction works. Some advance works will also be carried out, including archaeological excavations, diversion of services and treatment of invasive species.

The detailed design of the new River Slaney Road Bridge was retendered on the 19th May 2021. The closing date for the competition was the 30th June 2021. Eleven tenders were received and all candidates have met the pass / fail criteria. The qualitative assessment is currently in progress and will be completed in October 2021.

The legal agreements required for the diversion of Irish Water services has been completed, Archaeological licences are in place, the bridge agreement with Irish Rail & CIE is being progressed, the application for the foreshore lease and foreshore licence is being progressed with the Department of Housing, Planning & Local Government - public consultation on the foreshore application closed in December 2020. The Foreshore Licence is expected to be issued in October 2021.

2.2 Wexford Flood Relief Scheme:

The project brief for design services for this Flood Relief Project was advertised on Etenders in early 2020. Seven tender submissions were received by the extended closing date of the 9th July 2020. Following a detailed tender assessment and evaluation process the decision not to award a contract arising from this tender competition has advised to all tenderers. A further procurement process will be commenced in the coming months.

RPS Ltd was appointed in March 2020 to undertake a wave and water level modelling study to support the main Flood Scheme. The draft report has been issued to Wexford County Council and the OPW for review. It has been determined that more detailed survey data was required to complete the modelling study.

This additional survey work was carried out last month and the final report is now being prepared.

Homeless Support Services Unit (HSSU)

Wexford County Council's Homeless Services and Support Unit (HSSU) is part of the south east region in terms of providing services and supports to vulnerable people. The region operates a regional **Homeless Prevention & Support Project**. The project prioritises homeless preventions by way of applying early interventions, mediation and prevention measures to those presenting seeking homeless services/emergency accommodation.

The HSSU operates between 10.00 am and 4.00 pm Monday to Friday and provides a range of services and supports to persons who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness. The Homeless Co-ordinator along with a multi-disciplinary team, heads the Unit up. They provide a care and case management model of support to people who present by working with them on a client specific support plan. This identifies the services or supports that the clients need to help them deal with issues and improve their chances of sustaining future tenancies by bringing these supports with them.

It is important to point out that the figures below represent the total number of calls to HSSU - it is not reflective of the number of individuals/families as quite often the same client may make multiple calls to the HSSU.

There were 519 calls to the HSSU from 1 st January 2021 to 18 th August 2021, the following were the breakdown of same:-

Wexford County Council recently employed two Social Care Workers on a contract basis. They will staff the HSSU rota and will be the first point of contact for homeless presentations.

Joint Policing Committee Meeting

The next meeting date of the Joint Policing Committee is scheduled for the 13th September 2021, 10.00am via MS Teams. This meeting will represent an opportunity for the JPC members to meet Chief Superintendent Anthony Pettit following his recent appointment to the Wexford Garda Division.

Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) Meeting

A meeting of the Local Community and Development Committee was held on the 15th July 2021 via MS Teams. Agenda items included extensions to both the SICAP & Healthy Ireland Fund with the members of Wexford LCDC approving funding of €150,065 to 85 community and voluntary groups under the Community Enhancement Programme 2021.

The next meeting of the Local Community and Development Committee is scheduled for the 23rd September 2021 via MS Teams.

Local Action Group (LAG) Meeting

A meeting of Local Community Development Committee acting as the Local Action Group was held on the 15th July 2021 via MS Teams, with the members approving funding of €646,703.72 for 12 projects under the LEADER Transitional Programme and the National Food Initiative Fund.

The next meeting of Local Community Development Committee acting as the Local Action Group is scheduled for the 23rd September 2021 via MS Teams.

Local Action Group (LAG) Managers Meeting

A regional meeting of the LAG Managers is scheduled to take place on 01st September 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

PPN

A new PPN Secretariat facilitator, Bernard O'Leary, started a 6-month rotation in the role on 12 July. Meetings of the PPN Secretariat were held online on the 12th, 19th and 28th July, and of the PPN Development Communications and Training subcommittee on 21st June and 26th July, and of the Finance subcommittee on 19th and 26th July. A meeting between the Secretariat and PPN LCDC reps was held online on 28th July. Municipal District meetings of PPN members were held online on 5th, 6th, 12th, 13th, 19th July.

All PPN members were contacted seeking nominations for vacancies on the Secretariat, the LCDC, and JPC. Nominations close 24th August. Four new organisations registered with Wexford PPN since the last monthly report.

Information bulletins were emailed to all PPN members on 21st and 25th June, 9th and 28th July and 10th August. PPN Facebook and Twitter pages are actively used.

National PPN structural review focus groups were held during July for Representatives on 14th and 23rd July (5 Wexford PPN nominees); for Staff on 14th July and 23rd July (2 nominees); for Other Members on 19th July and 22nd July (3 nominees); and for Secretariat Network (1 nominee). The focus group for Local Authorities on 19th July was communicated via CCMA. A consolidated written submission on the structural review combining 5 individual submissions was submitted online on 17th August.

All reports and documentation requested for an audit of Wexford PPN financial return for 2019 was emailed to the DRCD auditor by 8th July.

All current five PPN environmental reps were invited to a South East regional meeting of PPN environmental reps on 8th September to report on updates on Climate Action Plans in the region.

INTERREG - Celtic Routes

The Celtic Routes suite of Comics have been printed and will be circulated in mid-September to all National Schools within the Irish Project Partner Area. A number will also be available for the relevant Local Authority Libraries. An application for SCORE funding has been submitted to facilitate a Legacy option for the Project. The end of July analysis of media output shows that 27,325,928 people have had the opportunity to see something about the Celtic Routes, with over 47,300 seeing the two-page spread in The Irish Sun on the 31st July 2021.

Social Media posts, Celtic Chapters and Travel Journalists for the remainder of August, September and October have been finalized with the September Newsletter in compilation. The script and locations of the next Celtic Routes video are under consideration by the Partners

Age Friendly Strategy and public consultations

The Age Friendly Strategy public consultations began –

- with older people at 28 online workshops which were attended by 190 older people in May.
- During June and July public consultation continued with members of the public aged over 55 invited to complete a survey to give us their views on many areas including housing, transport, health services, security, etc.
- The outcomes and feedback received will influence the actions identified in the 2022-2026 Age Friendly Strategy.

Work has also commenced on organising targeted focus group meetings which will take place on 6th & 7th September.

Telehealth

Work is continuing to progress on the national Telehealth pilot which Wexford Age Friendly are working on with Age Friendly Ireland, HSE, Waterford IT and Tunstall Emergency Response. This pilot ends the last week of August and Waterford IT will have the first draft of the evaluation ready end of September.

Creative Ireland Funding - Creativity in Older Age 2021

Wexford Age Friendly in partnership with WCC Arts Office received funding in respect of 2 projects which are progressing:

- Enniscorthy Activity Garden at St. John's Hospital, Enniscorthy the aim of this project is to further enhance this newly developed green space using creative practitioners (artists and craft makers) in order to encourage greater use and enjoyment of this sizeable and currently underutilised green space. Work is ongoing on the planning stages for this project including the appointment of an architect for the activity garden.
- Expansion of the current music therapy programme with patients in The Ivy Ward, a
 dementia ward at St. John's Hospital, Enniscorthy. These sessions have been completed
 and feedback from the HSE and musicians has been extremely positive. We are also
 planning to deliver this programme to people living with dementia in the community when
 restrictions allow.

Wexford Dementia Working Group

The Wexford Dementia Working Group has produced an information leaflet which signposts the services and supports that are available in the county to people living with dementia and their carers/family members. Electronic and hard copies are available from Ann Mare Laffan in the Community Section.

ENVIRONMENT

A. COVID-19 RESPONSE

Throughout the third lockdown, work has continued in line with the CCMA's guidance document of 21st October, 2020. Office based staff are now working an alternate teams pattern to minimise attendance, ensuring that the office is covered while increasing physical distancing. All staff have the resources to work remotely while not physically in the office.

Outdoor staff continue to work to ensure the Civic Amenity Centres, Rapid Response Crews, Environment and Dog Warden Services remains operational.

Piers and Harbours staff are maintaining staffing levels in Wexford, Kilmore Quay and New Ross offices to provide support for essential workers.

B. COASTAL MATTERS

Harbours -

14 minor projects on harbours and marinas were approved by the Department of Ag, Food & Marine (DAFM) under their annual harbour development programme; the total estimated project cost is €445,000 with 75% funding from DAFM. Work is progressing to complete these schemes.

An Taisce awarded blue flags for marinas at Kilmore Quay and New Ross for the 2021 sseason.

Fethard Harbour – New Slipway and Beach Access. Part XI planning application is being prepared for submission.

Ports Past and Present: There is ongoing engagement with the Rosslare community, artists and and our project partners in University College Cork and two Welsh universities. Regular updates and further information is available at https://portspastpresent.eu/

Dredging at Carne Pier was completed in April 2021.

Marinas at Kilmore Quay and New Ross are now open for all vessels, in line with government health guidelines.

The seasonal navigation buoyage at Wexford Harbour, as well as the swim area buoyage at Courtown, Cahore and Carne has been deployed.

A new website for the Port of New Ross has been developed. www.newrossport.ie

ISPS certification has been extended for the Port of New Ross until 30th September 2021, engagement with the Marine Survey Office is ongoing.

Beaches -

Blue Flag beaches: An Taisce awarded 5 blue flags for Wexford. Morriscastle, Ballinesker, Curracloe, Rosslare, Carne for the 2021 season.

Ballymoney did not get a blue flag due to water quality standards over the past four years, moving from excellent to good status. The sand level at Courtown has not recovered suitably and therefore cannot be awarded a blue flag for 2021.

Green Coast Award beaches: An Taisce announced successful applications for all 9 green coast beach awards – Cahore Oldbawn, Culleton's Gap, St Helen's Bay, Ballyhealy, Cullenstown, Grange, Baginbun and Booley Bay.

Sampling and testing of the bathing waters started on 24th May 2021 and will continue through to mid September. Results are available throughout the summer season on the EPAs website www.beaches.ie

Coast -

Seaview, Kilmore: Wexford County Council is in the process of appointing consulting engineers to carry out the design of a suitable coastal protection scheme and a beach access. The Council went to tender for emergency coastal protection works to protect the first section (approx 70m) of access road in July; this tender is being assessed. We expect works to commence in Autumn 2021.

Lady's Island Water Level Management Structure – Wexford County Council submitted further information on this planning application to An Bord Pleanala. The submission is being considered by An Bord Pleanala.

Bike Stands; work is progressing to install approximately 50 bike stands at 13 beach/coast locations around the coast. This funding for these was received through the Active Travel Scheme.

Morriscastle Dune Restoration: The project involves installation of fencing and maram grass planting to restore and manage the dune system at main beach entrance. WCC received €11,475 in funding for this project under the National Biodiversity Action Plan Funding. Works are underway to progress the project.

Ballinamona beach has a new acces ramp and public car parking.

C. PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

All public conveniences are now re-opened.

Minor refurbishment works to Curracloe Public Convenience and major refurbishment works to Carne Public Convenience have been completed.

D. WASTE MANAGEMENT

1. Landfills:

Holmestown Landfill remains temporarily closed. Environmental monitoring and maintenance of infrastructure continues at both Killurin and Holmestown in accordance with the conditions of our waste licences.

The Household Recycling Centre at Holmestown continues to provide recycling services to members of the public as well as a disposal service for other waste streams such as residual waste, bulky waste, segregated food waste, garden waste and waste paint.

4. Food Waste

The Food Waste Regulations 2013 are in force in all towns with >500 population. They impose obligations on Waste Collectors and householders. Collectors must provide separate bins for collection of food waste and householders must segregate their waste by either using "brown bins" provided by their waste collection company; composting at home, bearing in mind that certain food wastes cannot be composted, or bringing it to an authorised facility. Householders in all towns and villages to whom the regulations apply were visited by Council staff as part of our ongoing information campaign. Food waste is now accepted at all four household recycling centres. The locations where the food waste regulations apply are outlined on map which shall be uploaded to the council's website shortly.

5. Waste Facility Permits:

We currently have fourteen Clean Soil and Stone sites in operation; seven construction and demolition sites, eight End of Life Vehicles and twelve Pay to Use Waste Compactor Unit. The full list of Waste Facility Permits and Certificates of Registration can be viewed on the Council's website.

Altogether there are 57 registered operational Waste Facility Permits and Certificates of Registration for premises involved in waste management activities in the County, one of those are in the process of renewal and also there are six new applications.

6. Enforcement:

The Waste Enforcement Team carries out routine and non-routine inspections of Waste Facilities and problem sites in accordance with the Recommended Minimum Criteria for Environmental Inspections (RMCEI) as required by the EPA. The 2021 inspection plan is being finallised and 2020 return were submitted to the EPA. The RMCEI Plan allocates 1,752 routine inspections by 25 Full Time Equivalent staff member. The inspection types cover the WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment) Regulations; ELV (End of Life Vehicles) Regulations; Waste Management (Packaging) Regulations; Household and Commercial Food Waste Regulations; Batteries, Tyres, etc.

The national waste priorities for 2021 are;

- Tackling significant illegal waste activity,
- Multi-Agency Sites of Interest,
- Construction and Demolition Activity,
- End-of-Life Vehicles (ELV) & the Waste Metal Sector.
- Waste Collection Household & Commercial.

7. Mattress / Furniture Amnesty

This year's initiative commenced on 17th August at Holmestown Waste Management Facility. Members of the public will have opportunities over 4 consecutive weeks to bring old mattresses for recycling to Holmestown, New Ross, Gorey and Enniscorthy recycling centres between Tuesday and Friday. Details of the dates involved are on the Wexford County Council website. Around 750 mattresses were received in the first week at Holmestown Recyling Centre.

E. LITTER MANAGEMENT

The Wexford County Council (Segregation, Storage and Presentation of Household and Commercial Waste) Bye-laws, 2018 came into effect from the 2nd January, 2019. From this date, anyone contravening the bye-laws will be liable to a fixed penalty of €75.

Complaints regarding litter are now being handled through the Customer Service Unit.

Environment was the first section to use this central system.

Any evidence collected from littering incidents is used in bringing action under the Litter Pollution legislation. It has been noted that less evidence is being recovered. More transactions have moved online and people are removing waste that may incriminate them. The use of CCTV has been halted due to restrictions imposed by the Data Protection Commissioner. The local press regularly reports on such cases. We will continue to target illegal dumping black-spots and the county's roads throughout the year.

There are now 31 registered Dog Breeding Establishments with a number of applications on hand awaiting inspection.

To 31st December, 2020, 35 equine were impounded (as against 50 in total for 2018). Most of the equine impounded in 2019 have been re-homed. No horses have been put to sleep in 2019 or 2020.

Environment Education and Awareness:

Our aim is to promote awareness and active participation in a range of environmental initiatives. **Green Schools:** An Taisce has circulated guidance documents for each of the green schools themes to help schools continue with their green schools programme safely. Closing date for applications was June 2021. Green flag assessments will be carried out virtually.

Green Estate Programme: The Green Estate Programme was officinally launched by Cllr Leonard Kelly Mayor, District of Wexford on Friday 5th March. The programme is an initial step to encourage residents to begin to think about creating areas for nature within the public spaces of their estate. The pilot programme is open to all estates in the Wexford Municipal Distrct.



Dog Fouling Awareness Campaign: This Campaign was launched by Cllr. Ger Carthy, Cathaoirleach on 31st March. The campaign is result of an initiative by Wexford, Carlow, Kilkenny, Waterford City & County Councils. The campaign promotes a simple message "Bag it & Bin it and will run for the remainder of 2021 and is set to firmly emphasize that dog fouling is your responsibility as a dog owner. The campaign will address a range of issues surrounding dog fouling, from its effect on the public who use our streets, parks and beaches, to attitudes to cleaning up as dog owners, from health issues to civic pride. The campaign will reach across social media, local newspapers, radio, community groups and schools.









The Green Dog Walker Campaign was promoted during January and received over 500 pledges in 4 days. The scheme is open again for registrations.





LIBRARIES, ARTS & ARCHIVES

Response to COVID

Wexford Libraries re-opened to the public, emerging from Level 5 restrictions, on Monday May 10th. Staff returned to work in the branch libraries on regular opening hours, including Saturdays and late opening on Tuesdays and Thursdays. In July and August, browsing and borrowing services with the collection of remote printing, mobile printing, and photocopying services continued. The use the study spaces and PCs remain unavailable to patrons under national guidelines.

While indoor physical library events remain suspended in library branches, the library service continues to provide public information using online platforms and social media, with online activities for adults and children.

Throughout July and August there was a significant increase in the number of in person events held outdoors for small literacy initiatives including story time, rhyme time, creative writing, crafts, health and wellbeing talks and a programme for Heritage week held in the outdoor designated zones at New Ross Library Park, Wexford Library Sensory Garden and Enniscorthy Library Garden. These events strictly adhered to social distancing guidelines and all other guidelines in place when providing outdoor events for both children and adult events.

Book Call Delivery Service

The Book Call Service continued throughout July and August; delivering 349 books and reading materials to elderly or vulnerable persons in their homes. A total of 7,120 items have been delivered from the Book Call delivery service to date this year.

Summer Stars National Reading Programme

This July and August over 1500 children and young people took part in the Summer Stars Reading Adventure in all five libraries, to retain their reading levels during the summer break from school. All those who participated in the Adventure received a certificate and a small incentive, bookmark, pencil and notebook, each time they returned to the library to change their books during this summer. This is a valuable and successful collaborative programme led by the local public library with schools and families in their local district.

Right to Read Literacy and Numeracy

Collections. Wexford Library Services has purchased a collection of picture books focusing on assisting children develop their social skills; anxieties, making friends, special needs, visiting the doctor, dentist, bereavement, welcoming new siblings, and transitioning to primary school are just some of the topics covered. A complete set has been supplied to all branch libraries and will be promoted to early learning centres in each district.

Literacy Licences. Libraries continue to roll out Nessy Read and Spell, Touch Type Read and Spell, Nessy dyslexia awareness and Reading Eggs licences to families throughout Wexford county. Feedback is very positive with parents noting an improvement in reading engagement.

Dormant Accounts Fund - Library Supports for Marginalised, Socially Excluded and Disadvantaged Communities

Wexford County Council Library Service has submitted applications for funding from Dormant Accounts Fund to provide six programmes to marginalised communities online in 2021in collaboration with local based partners. This funding will deliver projects in all municipal districts. Projects will focus on delivering digital literacy, visual literacy and story making, language development and cultural awareness, a sensory pod and STEAM for young adults; these will in time remove barriers and give communities and individuals at risk of being socially excluded, marginalised or disadvantaged, confidence to access library services.

Decade of Centenaries 2021

The Decade of Centenary programme for County Wexford in 2021 received approval from the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

Events were held to commemorate the War of Independence truce on July 11, 1921 in Enniscorthy and in Murrintown the Garden of Remembrance opened.

"Flames along the Irish coast", an online film detailed the burning of the coastguard stations and three lectures were added to the online collection. The Wexford Archive published an online exhibition on the War of Independence; an accompanying physical exhibition opened in Enniscorthy Castle in late August.

Heritage Week

National Heritage Week was celebrated in the week of 14th to 22nd August 2021 across the county. Gorey Ballygarrett Comhaltas performed on the plaza outside Gorey library. Celestine Murphy delivered an outdoor talk on the Wexford Town Wall from the new Wexford Library garden. Historian in Residence Barry Lacey spoke on Wexford Railways in the War of Independence and Civil War outdoors in New Ross and Wexford. At Enniscorthy library Jeremy Hill delivered an online lecture on the 19th Century Letter Books of Edward Richards (1826-1911).

Local Studies & Genealogy

There were 32 genealogy enquiries and 77 local studies enquiries in July and August. Over 600 copies of Volumes 2 & 3 of "On Your Own Ground: County Wexford parish by parish" have been sold. It is available through Selskar Bookshop and The Book Centre in Wexford town, and from O'Leary's Bookshop in Bunclody.

Age Friendly Libraries

Supported by Age Friendly Ireland and Local Government Management Agency (LGMA) Libraries Development Unit, Wexford Libraries now provide an Age Friendly Digital Ambassador in each of their 5 libraries. Staff are trained to assist older people to join their local library online, access online library resources, download their favourite books or listen to audio books. This is a peer-to-peer programme which helps participants to develop the confidence to become mentors themselves and show their peers how to do the same.

Healthy Ireland At Your Library

Wexford Public Libraries broadcast a series of talks on health topics on the Wexford Public Libraries' YouTube channel. "Good Nutrition for Healthy Ageing". a video by dietician Didi de Zwarte was added in August. 'Mental Health Mondays' is a new series of Facebook videos and posts to highlight books available that address mental health. In New Ross Library Park Croi Yoga facilitated a family yoga session for children and parents outdoors in July and Edward Hayden, chef, writer and blogger gave a talk in August.

Activator Poles Session with Sports Active in Library Park.

To celebrate the first HER Outdoors Week 9th - 15th August, New Ross Library in conjunction with Sports Active Wexford provided two Activator Pole Sessions in Library Park for women to participate in outdoor sports. Walking with Activator Poles improves stability, reduces impact on hip and knee joints, improves core strength and posture and helps promote a functional gait pattern. The poles may be suitable for those with post/hip knee surgery, Multiple Sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, Osteoarthritis, Fall Prevention and overall fitness levels.

Adult Literature & Art Appreciation

In pandemic times, reading groups adapted to online discussion, this continued in the summer months through the Wexford Libraries' Online Book club, a text- based conversation through a Facebook group. This now has 283 members. There are now also three online reading groups facilitated by librarians using Microsoft Teams.

An Art Exhibition: 'A Sense of Self', a Creative Communities Project with artist Mary-Claire Kehoe and Duille Nua Day Centre exhibited in Wexford library in August. This project is funded by the Arts Department of Wexford County Council.

Work Matters

Alan Maher of Maher Consulting gave an online live talk on 'Acquiring/joining a franchise' for people in the Gorey district in August. Wexford Libraries continued to promote Work Matters Business eResources online in the July and August e-mail newsletters, giving mention to business and employment eBooks and eAudiobooks on BorrowBox, and business training courses on Universal Class. Customers are advised they can email Wexford Libraries in advance with their business queries for Mintel and Business.ie.

ARCHIVES

Collections management

The Archive dealt with 82 research enquiries via email, telephone and post during July and August. The service continues to conduct detailed research for enquiries, where possible, in an effort to facilitate researchers until the Archive's reading room reopens.

War of Independence

The Wexford Archive launched an online exhibition on the War of Independence in County Wexford in mid-August through the website www.wexfordcountyarchive.com

A physical exhibition based on the online version opened in Enniscorthy Castle in late August. Consisting of six pull-up banners, it is accompanied by a select display of original items, some of which featured in the online exhibition.

Work on a revised catalogue of the Edward Roe collection commenced in late August. Roe, a member of Cushinstown Company of the South Wexford Brigade of the IRA, was an active participant during the War of Independence and Civil War periods.

ARTS

Local Live Performance Programming Scheme (LLPPS) – July – Sept 2021)

Wexford Arts office is overseeing the implementation of the LLPS scheme funded through the Department of 'Arts, Culture Tourism' via all local authorities nationwide. The aim of this once off scheme is to support the live music /entertainment / performance industry that has been so badly affected by COVID 19, and to encourage local audiences to attend live music & performance events in safe outdoors settings in keeping with HSE and Department national guidelines. In July Wexford County Council held an open call to professional events companies inviting them to be part of a panel for the delivery of services for live outdoor performances across the 5 municipal districts in Summer 2021. Three companies were awarded the tenders and are working with each district.

- Gorey-Kilmuckridge MD Lantern productions staged "Sounds of Summer" in Gorey Civic plaza with 'Love Gorey' from 19-22nd Aug – a 4-day festival which included live music and comedy for adults and family focused entertainment with Puppet Shows & Outdoor Cinema Screenings.

 Lantern productions are staging 'Sounds of Summer' in Orchard Peace
 park from 26-29th August a 4-day weekend festival included local bands, spoken word
 performance and family entertainment.
- New Ross MD— Event Lighting Solutions are staging a series of "Saturday Night Live" concerts in the Library Park throughout July, August and September including local, national and international music acts.
- Rosslare MD Ad Personam Cultural Events Ltd Delivered Castle-Lake Arts Festival on 7th
 August the grounds of Johnstown Castle which included live Music, theatre, pop up events
 throughout the grounds and film screening. In addition, Events Lighting will deliver 'Garden
 Fest' an evening of live music in the gardens of Piercestown Scout Hall with national and
 local bands
- Wexford MD Lantern is presenting 'The Home Stretch' for Min Ryan Park, Wexford for September 10th - 12th. Three headline national bands will perform over the three evenings supported by bands local bands.

Emergence Visual Art Award:2021-23

This significant national award is a partnership between Wexford Arts Office, Wexford Arts Centre and Wexford Campus School of Art and Design (IT Carlow). The aim of this award is to support visual artists at the earlier stages of their careers with the development of their practice. This award is presented biannually and has a value of €15,000 over 2 years, this includes mentorship support and a solo exhibition at Wexford Arts Centre in 2023. As part of this award the artist will connect with Carlow IT Wexford campus to develop a programme of work with students and faculty. Following a nationwide open call in May, 65 applications were received, and 10 artists shortlisted. A selection panel met in August to review final shortlist and Wexford artist Emma Roche was selected as Emergence awardee 2021-23.

Small Arts Festival Grant Scheme 2021

The following festivals and experimental events were recipients of this scheme in 2021 and took place live in controlled settings in keeping with Covid 19 guidelines:

The Gap Arts Festival – In its eleventh year the Gap Arts Festival took place in Ballythomas from 6th – 8th August. This involved a live outdoor family classical concert & theatre showcasing of The Gap Short Play, a new 4-part, 3D audio Headphone Experience series "Are You Ready?", Nature Slate Community Art Project, Outdoor Cinema, Sculpture and much more. In addition, a special Opera Film screening took place in partnership with Irish National Operas Touring scheme

The Three Billboards outside Gorey -. a public art Billboard project featuring contemporary art took place in Gorey over 8 weeks July – August 2021. The Billboards are designed to be visible to scores of people; providing a touchstone and a dialogue with passersby. Eight artworks were selected through an open call seeking work to be submitted in relation to the theme "Our Dreams Matter" to be exhibited alongside an artwork from guest artist Genevie Figgis. The selected artworks were displayed on three billboards in Gorey, Wexford, over six weeks during the July & August with each selected work shown for two weeks.

Fuddle Fest – This Music festival took place on Fuddletown in Kilinick over 2 days Saturday from 21st August to Sunday 22nd August 20201. Fuddle Fest spanned a wide range of music genres from the best ion contemporary classical to Irish traditional to electronic house. Events included a solo piano recital by Bill O'Brien, an audio-visual installation a trad session with Tuluat, creative storytelling around a bonfire with Adam Miller etc.

One Voice Festival – Tales from the Quays – Wexford Arts Centre in association with Paul Walsh Productions presented a unique festival of tales from the quay in Wexford Arts Centre on August 14th. This was a selection of specially created monologues written and delivered by some of Wexford's best-known artists. There was a mix of comedy, dark fairy-tale, exploration of relationships and a look at life in a small town by the sea.

(CATCH 2021), - The First Fathom - An art exhibition with a difference - The artworks selected for this unique outdoor show reflected concerns about the sea and the coastal environment. The pieces were robust, waterproof, weather resistant and environmentally friendly, they occupied the littoral space between the tides at preselected locations. The exhibition was on public display from the 28th to the 31st of August at:

- Good Tide Gallery @ The Burrow Beach
- In Between Tides Gallery @ The Little Beach
- Glacier Gallery @ St. Patrick's Bridge

Drama League of Ireland, in partnership with Drama League of Ireland provided two scholarships to Wexford applicants for the Drama League's 55th Residential Summer School which took place at the University of Limerick from 31st July – 7th August 2021. Local amateur participants and members of drama societies were invited to apply for this scholarship. Mairead Connaughton and Niall Hunter were successfully selected for this residency.

Ancient Connections - Public Art Announcement

Ancient Connections (the Wexford - Wales EU programme) announced the selected of a new permanent public art piece to be sited in Ferns and St David's in Wales in July 2021. 'The Little Things' by internationally renowned Welsh artists Bedwyr Williams was selected by a panel across Wexford and Wales and the communities to create this new piece of public art that will link Ferns, Co. Wexford with St David's, Pembrokeshire. Bedwyr swill create a series of giant beehive sculptures, sites to be confirmed in Ferns and in St David's Cathedral grounds. These beautiful structures would be modelled on traditional ancient beehives called skeps and will be functional and house real bee colonies. The artist intends for these living beehives to be cared for and tended by local beekeepers across both locations with support from the artist, the ancient connections team, and local arts and heritage offices. An education/ outreach programme will be developed across both locations around bee keeping, honey production and biodiversity.

Summer Sessions – Young Voices hosted by Rachel Grace Music and Wexford Arts Centre took place weekly from 22nd July to 12th August and featured new voices selected from an open call. Each young voice act had the opportunity to preform two songs/spoken word pieces. The events were open to limited audience and recorded with further mentoring provided by musicians Karen Dunbar and Gayle Murphy.

Music Generation

Music Generation Wexford is association with **Music Ireland** brought classical music to children through their Wells House concert series in July. These educational videos will be brought to primary schools in and around Wexford so that children can learn more about classical music.

Music Generation Instrument Bank has been significantly enhanced in 2021 with the purchase of 40 guitars, and hundreds of ukuleles as well as glockenspiels which will be used for the vocal programme to be developed over the next couple of months.

The Creative Hub

Studios are re-opened in keeping with government and HSE guidelines around social distancing etc. Over Thirty artists are currently in residence in the Creative Hub across 9 studio/ units combining individual group's studios and retails units as well as a dance studio which is managed by Wexford Arts centre on behalf of the Arts Office. Through the month of August, several demonstrations, workshops and talks were hosted by the Makers House in line with government and HSE guidelines.

Screen Wexford

Screen Wexford received €19,500 in funding from Screen Skills Ireland through their Stakeholders Fund for the delivery for Virtual reality (VR) & Virtual Production training for the Screen industry. This training programme will provide for a masterclass programme and intensive workshops for delivery in 2021-22 with local service providers including key partner Gorey School of Arts. Screen Wexford is an initiative of Wexford County Council 's Arts and Economic Development departments to promote the development of the Film / Screen industry in Wexford, to upskill local crews, to promote tourism and Wexford as a film friendly county and attractive film destination nationally and internationally.

CREATIVE IRELAND

Enniscorthy Activity Garden

Wexford County Council in partnership with the HSE, Creative Ireland and the Irish Architecture Foundation announce that artist Esther Gerrard is the successful candidate of the Phase One-Research Phase of the creative enhancement of the Enniscorthy Activity Garden which will be located on the campus of St John's Community Hospital, Enniscorthy. Phase Two of the project will take place between 2021 -2023. Consultation meetings took place with key stakeholders in July – August 2021 with onsite workshops planned for September – November 2021

Animating Town Districts Through Creative Events

This project places creativity at the heart of local areas around Wexford. Our 5 municipal districts are working collaboratively with local creatives in animating towns and villages projects include visual art workshops, murals, creation of a short film based on Wexford's heritage and a range of multi-disciplinary projects.

Design & Make in 3D

Young teenagers involved in the FDYS Enniscorthy and Coolcotts social inclusion projects took part in a fortnight of STEAM workshops and demonstrations with TEKcentral in July. Supported by Wexford libraries this programme enables young adults, aged 12-17 years develop their creative and IT skills by taking part in a two part, hands on design by technology project. Phase 1, STEM taster workshops were held outdoors in July. The second phase to design, make and create with Tinkercad will be held at Halloween. The young people will present their work and learnings to their peers, youth workers, families and a public audience in an online production for Wexford Science Festival in Science Week.

Civil Defence – Operations / Training Report June – August 2021

Wexford Civil Defence has been tasked to provide support to the Community Forum helpline in County Hall, HSE and Department of Defence since week 23rd March 2020.

We provided 1 transport for to the HSE Test Centre in Wexford from New Ross.

The Gorey unit provided 4 volunteers each day to support the HSE Pop UP Test Centre in Gorey on 6th and 7th June.

We have carried out 17 transports during June - August, to include persons to hospital or Doctor's appointments, Transports have been to Dublin, Waterford and Wexford.

We have also transported one person to the COVID test centre in Wexford.

We have transported 26 people to and from the Vaccination Centre in Enniscorthy during June – August.

Vaccination Centre Enniscorthy

Volunteers provided 51 full days of support to the vaccination centre in Enniscorthy up to the 14th June. We would have 4 volunteers on per day helping with the queuing of people and observation area.

We have provided volunteers to help with the running of the Irish Blood Transfusion Service clinics in Wexford and New Ross.

N11 Ferns Pavement Scheme

The tender for the archaeology monitoring project was awarded on the 16th August.

The tender for the construction contract was awarded on the 11th August. Works are due to commence on 8th October with a 12 week programme.

Capital Maintenance Pavement repair N25 Whitford Roundabout

This minor repair scheme was tendered in mid-August. The contract will be awarded in early September and works should be completed by the end of October this year.

Capital Maintenance Pavement repair N30 Tominearly

This minor repair scheme was tendered in mid-August. The contract will be awarded in early September and works should be completed by the end of October this year.

HD28 Pavement Improvement Works N11 Oilgate Village

The extent of the works was agreed with TII on 19th August. Tender documents will be progressed in September. It is planned to invite tenders before the end of September.

HD28 Pavement Improvement Works junction of N25 at Larkins Cross.

Minor pavement repairs at the junction with the N25 and R738 will be tendered in September and should be completed in October this year.

REGIONAL AND LOCAL ROADS

The Regional and Local Road Grant Allocations were announced on 15 February 2021. Wexford's allocation was €18,569,130, an increase of €1,481,123 on 2020.

Community Involvement Schemes

Five roads have been resurfaced this year from a total of nine.

Applications are presently being received for consideration in 2022 and 2023.

Local Improvement Schemes

Wexford County Council was allocated €349,878 on 17 June from the Department of Rural and Community Development to resurface all twelve lanes on the priority list. Two of these lanes have been surfaced in the last two months and were: Ballyvarogue, Saltmills; Clonleigh, Palace;

On 29th July Wexford County Council was allocated an additional € 303,908 to resurface ten more lanes. This brings the total grant allocation to €653,786 for 2021.

Bridge Rehabilitation Grant

Bridges completed in the last two months were:

Aughwilliam Bridge (Rosslare District).

Specific Improvement Works - The Deeps Bridge

The Deeps Bridge Remediation Project – RPS Consulting Engineers Ltd have been appointed as Project Supervisor for the Design Process in March. An underwater inspection of the bridge structure has been carried out and found no defects below the water. A structural inspection of the bridge has been completed. This will inform the detailed design. A stage 1 Appropriate Assessment Screening was complete and the planned works did not screen out. A Natura Impact Statement is in progress and will be submitted to An Board Pleanala as part of the planning application in early September. It is intended to develop the design options over the coming months. Works are expected to commence Q 2/3 of 2022.

Climate Adaptation & Resilience Works

Wexford County Council received €650,830 for 13 projects on 4 June. This funding was received from the Department of Transport following submission of an application on 31 March.

One drainage project has been completed at Dungeer Road, New Ross. The other 12 projects are at planning stage.

Active Travel Measures

Wexford County Council was allocated €3,603,000 for 50 Active Travel projects in the County in the March '21. An additional €2,310,008 was allocated in the July for 21 extra projects. This brings the total Active Travel allocation for 2021 to €6,188,563 including increased amounts to 4 of the 71 projects in total.

Additional Outdoor Infrastructure

€673,000 was allocated to Wexford County Council under the Additional Outdoor Infrastructure Fund (2021) for 11 projects throughout the county on 26 May. This funding was received from the National Transport Authority following submission of an application on 31 March.

PUBLIC LIGHTING

LED Upgrade (Non National Roads)

Over 12,000 lanterns have been upgraded to LED since the beginning of 2016.

Design works are completed.

It is hoped to complete the upgrade of the remaining 400 lanterns on non-National roads and housing estates by mid-October.

Finance:

Budget 2022

COVID -19

The COVID 19 emergency continues to impact on the finances of Wexford County Council and this is reflected in the reported outturn to the end of June 2021 as set out in the Q2 Finance Report circulated to members.. Emergency expenditure on our response to the crisis in 2021 includes significant spend on the Hauliers testing centre in Holmestown at the outset of 2021 and we await confirmation of recoupment of these costs. The continuation of the Rates Waiver for most of ratepayers who qualified in 2020 has been welcome and is currently applicable for 9 months of 2021 (Jan to Sept), as confirmed by Circular Fin 14/2021. The 100% waiver for this period has been applied to all eligible rate accounts. Other areas of income are underperforming in 2021 and Parking Income would be a particular concern as it is still showing signs of pressure from the pandemic with only 21% of budgeted income recorded at the end of June.

Q2 Finance Report - to 30 th June 2021

The Q2 Finance Report has been circulated to members. There is a reported deficit in the revenue position for this quarter which is largely informed by factors associated with the COVID health emergency. The finances and cash flow of the council continue to be carefully monitored and managed as we move through the covid emergency and deal with the various elements of its impact on the council's financial business.

Budget 2022

Work is now commencing on the preparation of Budget 2022 following the first statutory decision made by members in July, making the decision to retain the 10% local variation factor for Local Property Tax in the county for 2022. The prescribed period for the holding of the statutory budget Meeting or GMA Meetings in the districts have not yet been notified but the expectation would be that the 2022 statutory budget meeting will be held on a date late in November 2021.

Cash Flow/Overdraft

The Council continues to operate with an overdraft facility, Ministerial Sanction is in place for borrowing by way of overdraft in the amount of €20m for the period to the 31st December, 2021. The requirement for ongoing overdraft facilities into 2022 will be reviewed in the coming as a formal application will need to be submitted to members in October to secure council approval and ministerial sanction for any extension of the facility into 2022.

Audit

- <u>Audit of Accounts 2020</u> The Audit of Wexford County Council's 2020 Accounts is ongoing and nearing completion. The Local Government Auditor is expecting to complete the audit in the coming weeks and will then prepare the statutory audit report to be submitted for consideration of the council. The 2020 Statutory Audit report will be presented to the council before the end of the current year.
- <u>Audit Committee</u> The next meeting is scheduled for October 2021. The Audit Committee will also
 meet with the Local Government Auditor before the end of the year to discuss the outcome of the
 2020 Audit. Following this the Audit Committee will prepare their report for the council on the Annual
 Accounts and Audit process.
